ANNUAL MEETING

Some Surprises About the Yellow-billed Cuckoo
with Shannon McNeil

Shannon, a Yellow-billed Cuckoo/Data/GIS Specialist with the Southern Sierra Research Station, has a BS in Computer Science and Statistics from Macquarie University in Sydney Australia, and an MS in Natural Resources from the University of Arizona in Tucson (MS thesis: Population Genetic Diversity and Structure in Yellow-billed Cuckoos). After studying several threatened species in the field, including golden-cheeked warblers and long-wattled umbrellabirds, in 2002 she began her journey trying to understand the elusive yellow-billed cuckoo, as a seasonal field biologist with the Southern Sierra Research Station. Since 2008 she has been monitoring the return of breeding cuckoos to created riparian forests on the lower Colorado River, under the Bureau of Reclamation LCR MSCP (Lower Colorado River Multi-Species Conservation Program).

Her talk will include Who Coos for Who?, How To Grow a Cuckoo Population, and Where Cuckoos Stop During Migration (from the project's latest GPS data to South America and back).

HOTSPRINGS VALLEY WETLAND ACQUISITION CALIFORNIA AUDUBON GRANT

Here's good news: Audubon California has committed \$100,000 from the Wimberly Wildlife Fund for Land Conservation toward the acquisition of the 189.26 acres adjoining the Bob Powers Gateway Preserve in the town of Lake Isabella. The money will be held in escrow until the balance of the needed \$700,000 or so dollars is obtained from individuals and from other granting agencies.

This land is next to the parcel where another grant obtained by Kerncrest Audubon helped fund some wetlands restoration work for breeding habitat for the now-California-endangered Tricolored Blackbird. The addition will provide needed foraging area to attract the blackbirds, as well as potential recreation area for residents and visitors to the area.

Several of you have contributed to the grass-roots campaign to fund this project. There is now an opportunity to make an even bigger "bang for the buck" as follows:

MEMBERSHIP

Those of you who receive paper Chats may have noticed most labels no longer have an expiration date indicated for members of the National society. PROJECT REPORT INYO CALIFORNIA TOWHEE HABITAT MONITORING

During April, a couple of teams led by Bob Parker drove and hiked to several springs on the east slope of the Argus range to check on the condition of the fences surrounding some of those springs to keep out horses and burros that might trample the riparian habitat. These springs are home for the endangered Inyo subspecies of the California Towhee.

We were working as volunteers for the Ridgecrest Field Office of the Bureau of Land Management. Bob carried along fence repair material and fixed several cut fences.

Knowing the wild horses and burros had not been rounded up and removed for several years, we were primarily interested in seeing what kind of damage they were doing. The good news is: we saw no signs of recent trampling damage. Only a few droppings of very old, dried scat were found, all outside the fences. We had been concerned that fences were not enough to protect the habitat and that there would be trampling and damage around the fence perimeters. That was not the case. Apparently if the water is not accessible, the animals depart for greener "pastures."

Other good news is that at one of the wetter springs with more lush surroundings, we saw 3 pairs of towhees, and one pair each was seen at 2 other springs. Still, the area is very dry and foraging sparse.

We have one more spring to check. Call Dan Burnett at 760-382-4934 if you would like to help.

We have no idea who cut the fences, when, or why. Maybe campers with horses? They are only horse and burro proof fences. Humans and coyotes can go under, bighorn over.

We plan to continue to monitor these springs annually.

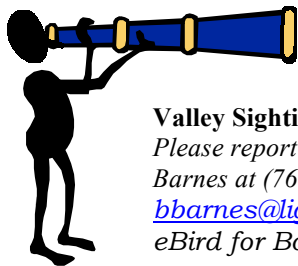
FAREWELL TO SHELLEY ELLIS

REPORTS:

Two **White-Faced Ibis** at RWWP Apr 2 (LSu, SSu).

Two **Black-bellied Plovers** at China Lake ponds Apr 1 were Kern County's first report for 2016 (SLS).

A **White-winged Dove** continued at China Lake Golf Course Apr 1 (SLS).

A **White-winged Dove** returned to a NW Ridgecrest yard Apr 6 (EC) and continued throughout the month (BB, EC).

One **Black-chinned Hummingbird**, two **Anna's Hummingbirds**, six **Costa's Hummingbirds**, & two **Rufous Hummingbirds** south of Inyokern Apr 4 (SLS).

A **Peregrine Falcon** was seen at the China Lake ponds for the Inyokern School Junior Audubon field trip on April 21 (BBu).

Four IWV FOS **Willow Flycatchers** at SSDC IBA's Indian Wells Canyon Apr 23 (LSu, SSu).

Hammond's Flycatcher 1, Pacific-slope Flycatcher 1, Hermit Thrush 1, Orange-crowned Warbler 1, Nashville Warbler 1, Western Tanager 1, Black-headed Grosbeak 12 north of Inyokern during a windy, migrant "fall out" day Apr 25 (TM).

Western Wood-Pewee, Hammond's Flycatcher (also 4/22, 423), Pacific-slope Flycatcher, Orange-crowned Warbler, Yellow Warbler, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, Lincoln's Sparrow, Green-tailed Towhee (also 4/22, 423), Hooded Oriole (also 3/20) at a Ridgecrest yard during the same windy Apr 25 (JS).

Three **Gray Flycatchers** at SSDC IBA's Indian Wells Canyon Apr 9 (LSu, SSu).

A **Dusky Flycatcher**, a **Pacific-slope Flycatcher**, and a **Wilson's Warbler** were IWV FOS at an east side Ridgecrest yard Apr 13 (LSu, SSu)

Loggerhead Shrike and **Le Conte's Thrasher** nesting success have been thwarted thus far by several predators at a yard SW of Inyokern (LK).

A **Western Scrub-Jay** at a NW Ridgecrest yard on Apr 18 was new for that location (BBu).

A **Common Raven** "landed on the street near me, rushed under a neighbor's pick-up, caught a fledgling mourning dove, beat on it with that honking big beak, then flew off with it." (LSu).

A **Rough-winged Swallow** at SSDC IBA's Freeman Canyon was a new species for that location (SLS).

Red-breasted Nuthatches in Ridgecrest through at least Apr 26 (BB).

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher & Brewer's Sparrow at SSDC IBA's Short Canyon Apr 2 were bird species #84 & #85 for that canyon. (SLS, BS).

An **Orange-crowned Warbler** at an east side Ridgecrest yard Apr 3 (LSu, SSu).

A **Common Yellowthroat** at an east side Ridgecrest yard Apr 8 (LSu, SSu).

An IWV FOS **Yellow Warbler** singing profusely as it passed through a NW Ridgecrest neighborhood Apr 20 (BB).

An IWV FOS **Yellow-breasted Chat** at an east side Ridgecrest yard on Apr 22 & 23 (LSu, SSu).

A **Brewer's Sparrow** at RWWP Apr 2 (LSu, SSu).

An IWV FOS **Green-tailed Towhee** at SSDC IBA's Indian Wells Canyon Apr 23 (LSu, SSu).

A **Western Tanager** at a yard in Ridgecrest Apr 3 (LT).

Black-headed Grosbeaks showed up right on schedule, with 2 pairs in a NW Ridgecrest yard on April 25 (BBu).

Four **Hooded Orioles** and four **Bullock's Orioles** south of Inyokern Apr 4 (SLS).

Five **Red Crossbills** south of Inyokern Apr 4 (SLS).

MAY BIRDING: The first half of May is still peak migration, with a few vagrants showing up in late May. Watch for rare oddities such as Wood Thrush, Worm-eating Warbler and other lost eastern birds. Keep watching for empidonax flycatchers, especially Willow. Hepatic Tanagers have also been known to show up, as have Swainson's Thrushes. And while you may not get the "first of spring," you can still enjoy looking at the Yellow, MacGillivray's and Wilsons warblers coming through.
