Habitat Restoration in San Francisco East Bay

KERN COUNTY'S OLDEST CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

The Inyo National Forest has removed the portable outhouses and closed the Kennedy Meadows campground. This would not necessarily be an Audubon issue but for the fact that the campground will likely continue to be heavily used, and the removal of the outhouses will result in pollution of the environment. FOF for **Ross's Geese** was from the ponds Nov 23 (SLS).

A **Common Goldeneye** was at the ponds Nov 23 (SLS).

Western Grebes were at the ponds Nov 12, 23, and 26 (JA, BB, SLS).

Also at the ponds on Nov 12 were an **American White Pelican** and a juvenile **Black-crowned Night Heron** (JA).

An **Osprey** flew over the children (and adult escorts) at the ponds on Nov 12 (JA).

A Virginia Rail was seen (and heard!) at the ponds on Nov 12 (JA).

Rounding out the exciting sightings for the Junior Audubon field trip on Nov 12 was a **Common Moorhen** (JA).

A Northern Pygmy-Owl was in Grapevine Canyon Nov 28 (BS, SLS). While this is a rarity in the valley, only three previous records, it is the second time this species has been found in this canyon. Other interesting birds included two pairs of Acorn Woodpeckers, a Mountain Chickadee, two Oak Titmice, Bushtits, two Western Bluebirds, two "Gray-headed" Dark-eyed Juncos, and twenty Pine Siskins.

Three **Tree Swallows** and a **Barn Swallow** were at the ponds Nov 23 (SLS).

A hike on Nov 11 designed to fill an ebird gap produced three new species for Cow Heaven Canyon Cooper's Hawk, Townsend's Solitaire, and Sagebrush Sparrow bringing this list to 94 species (SLS, BS). Yes, it does look like 100 species are possible for this canyon with little riparian habitat. Other interesting birds included Bushtits, and a White-breasted Nuthatch.

A **House Wren** was at the ponds Nov 30 (SLS).

A **Pacific Wren** was SW of Inyokern Nov 5-10 (LK). This is a very rare visitor to the valley, last being seen here in 2011. Most of our records are from November.

Two **Golden-crowned Kinglets** were at the ponds Nov 12 (SLS). This is only the 3rd record at that location.

Red-breasted Nuthatches continue to be reported (L&SSu, SLS, BB, TM).

Our only report of **Cedar Waxwing** this month was from SW of Inyokern on Nov 18 (LK).

Two **Western Bluebirds** were seen in Sage Canyon on Nov 21, along with several **Mountain Bluebirds** (BBu).

Two **Chipping Sparrows** were in Ridgecrest Nov 22 (BB).

A **White-throated Sparrow** was S of Inyokern Nov 11-13 (SLS).

Red Crossbills were in Ridgecrest Nov 18 (BB), SW of Inyokern Nov 14-15 (PW), and S of Inyokern Nov 29 (SLS).

Two **Pine Siskins** were S of Inyokern Nov 11 (SLS) and a larger group was SW of Inyokern through at least Nov 15 (PW).

FOF for **American Goldfinch** was Nov 11 (BB, SLS) in multiple locations.

A **Bullock's Oriole** was seen in Ridgecrest Nov 20 and 21 (L&SSu).

FEDERAL DUCK STAMPS

Did you know the revenue from purchases of Federal duck stamps is used to purchase land for National Wildlife Refuges? (The stamps are now called Migratory Bird Hunting and Conservation Stamps.) By now, stamp sales have surpassed \$900 million and helped to protect 6.5 million acres of wetland and grassland habitat.

In addition to being a ticket to all National Wildlife Refuges, a requirement for anyone over 16 who wants to hunt, and a beautiful collectible item, these stamps provide many benefits to migrating and nesting wildfowl and many other birds and wildlife.

You can buy them online at the US Post Office website: www.usps.gov/ but it's not easy.

First, go to www.usps.com, and do NOT click on "buy stamps". Instead, look at the top of the page and click on Postal Store. That will put you on a page where the list on the left of clickable links includes Federal Duck Stamps.

There you go! This year's design is our own locally-nesting Ruddy Duck, at \$25. Last year's beautiful Canvasback is also still available, at \$15. There are also "Junior Duck" stamps using designs from winners of contests for young artists. Check those out, too!
